Main Sermon Passage

Ezekiel 37:1–14

Study Passages of the Week

Ezekiel 1–3, 33–39; Psalm 45

Theme or Focus

Can These Bones Live? The Breath of God Restores

Ezekiel ministered to the Jewish exiles in Babylon during one of Israel's darkest periods. Ezekiel 1–3 records his dramatic vision of God's glory and his commissioning as a prophet and watchman to call God's people to repentance. Chapters 33–39 shift from messages of judgment to promises of restoration, assuring the exiles that God had not abandoned His covenant people.

These chapters emphasize God's holiness, sovereignty, and power to restore what appears beyond hope. The vision of the valley of dry bones illustrates that only God's Spirit can bring true life and renewal. Theologically, Ezekiel points to God's promise to restore His people physically and spiritually through His life-giving presence.

Psalm 45 celebrates God's righteous King and His everlasting kingdom. Together, these passages proclaim that God alone has the power to renew, restore, and fulfill His promises.
